Board of Trustees Regular Meeting & 2026 Budget HearingMINUTES

Thursday, November 20, 2025 at 4:00pm McGuire Community Room 610 Woodmere Ave., Traverse City, MI 49686

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President Pakieser at 4:00pm. Present were: Pakieser (President); Deyo (Vice President); Odgers (Treasurer); Vickery, Jones, and Beuthin (Trustees). Gedman (Secretary) and Howard (Director) were absent. Also present were: Morey (standing in for Howard); Baldwin, Brady, and Carpenter (Staff).

2. Pledge of Allegiance

All members in attendance recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

3. Approval of the Agenda

It was MOVED by Jones, SUPPORTED by Deyo, to approve the agenda as presented. Motion CARRIED.

4. Public Comment

President Pakieser opened the floor for public comment. There was none.

On behalf of the trustees, President Pakieser recognized Heather Brady, Marketing and Communications Manager, as the 2025 Michgan Library Association Support Staff of the Year award recipient. She gave thanks and appreciation to Brady for all that she does for the library and presented her with a flower arrangement and card.

It was then MOVED by Jones, SUPPORTED by Deyo to open the 2026 Budget Hearing. Motion CARRIED.

5. Public Hearing on the 2026 Budget

- a. Introduction of the 2026 Budget President Pakieser
- b. Budget Overview and Details
 Baldwin, Finance and HR Manager, provided a brief overview of the 2026 budget figures, noting that it is a balanced budget of \$9,325,820. She also answered questions from the trustees.
- c. *Public Comment*There was no public comment.

6. Discussion and Action to Adopt the 2026 Budget

Jones read from the budget resolution indicating that appropriations from the total budget be made in the following categories: \$5,162,936 for Personnel Services; \$1,414,483 for Supplies; \$2,414,401 for Other Services and Charges, and \$334,000 for Capital Outlays. A roll call was taken with the following results:

Odgers – aye Gedman – absent Jones - aye
Beuthin – aye Deyo – aye Vickery – aye

Pakieser – aye

Motion CARRIED with 6 aye and 1 absent.

It was MOVED by Jones, SUPPORTED by Deyo, to close the 2026 budget hearing. Motion CARRIED.

It was MOVED by Beuthin, SUPPORTED by Deyo to accept and affirm receipt of the Consent Calendar items as presented. Motion CARRIED.

8. Items Removed from the Consent Calendar

No items were removed from the Consent Calendar.

9. **Director Report**

Morey, reported in Howard's absence that the second Repair Café was a huge success and value to patrons. He also noted that he hosted a soup season Instant Pot program with great attendance and delicious soup samples were enjoyed by all.

10. Old Business

a. Building Control System – Variable Air Valve Project Boulter, Facilities Manager, noted that while the budget for a two-phased VAV project had been approved in 2023, costs have risen since then for the second phase. Of the quotes received, Trane was able to provide optimal phase two completion and value. It was MOVED by Jones, SUPPORTED by Deyo, to authorize the Director to pay Trane, Inc. to upgrade the Building Control System and replace all Variable Air Valves for a cost not to exceed, \$88, 675. A roll call vote was taken with the following results:

Odgers – aye Gedman – absent Jones - aye
Beuthin – aye Deyo – aye Vickery – aye

Pakieser – aye

Motion CARRIED with 6 aye and 1 absent.

b. Policy Revision: 4.6 Meeting Room Policy

Beuthin noted that the policy revisions were in response to adjustments that needed to be made to ensure that the room is not misused. It was MOVED by Beuthin, SUPPORTED by Vickery, to approve the revisions to 4.6 Meeting Room Policy as presented. Motion CARRIED.

c. Policy Revision: 4.1 Behavior Policy (Recommended changes by TADL attorney)

Beuthin reported that the revised behavior policy was a result of Howard working with TADL's attorney, Anne Suerynck, regarding specific behavioral issues and changes. The attorney recommended a comprehensive policy revision that is consistent with current practice and requirements. Odgers inquired about prohibiting library materials in restrooms and Morey

provided an example that clarified her concern. It was MOVED by Beuthin, SUPPORTED by Deyo to accept 4.1 Behavior Policy as presented. Motion CARRIED.

d. Policy Removal and Number Re-assignment: FROM 4.2 Smoke, Tobacco, alcohol and Drug Free Campus Policy TO 4.2 Library Violations and Appeal Policy

Beuthin noted that this policy removal, number reassignment, and new policy would provide streamlining and clean-up of the policies. It was MOVED by Beuthin, SUPPORTED by Jones, to approve the removal of the Smoke, Tobacco, and Drug free Campus policy now covered in policy 4.1, and to reassign policy number 4.2 to the supplemental appeal portion of policy 4.1. Motion CARRIED.

11. New Business

a. Resolution: 2025-26 Health Insurance Contributions PA 152 Opt Out
Baldwin explained that in years past TADL elected to comply with the hard cap requirements of
the Publicly Funded Contribution Act. This year the state did not include 4.2% for inflation and
insurance rates also went up 17-18%, resulting in exceeding the hard cap. Opting out of the hard
cap will serve the Library and employees well, especially since agreements have already been
reached with the bargaining unit. She recommended that TADL elect to adopt the opt-out of the
cost sharing model requirements as set forth in PA 152. Some discussion ensued. It was MOVED
by Beuthin, SUPPORTED by Deyo that the Board of Trustees elect to comply with the
requirements of the Publicly Funded Health Insurance Contribution Act by adopting the opt-out
of the cost sharing model as set forth in PA 152 as presented. Motion CARRIED.

12. Public Comment

President Pakieser opened the floor for public comment. The following people addressed the board: Bret Boulter, TADL Facilities Manager, highlighted how successful and well received the 2nd Repair Café was and hopes that Green Door School and TADL partner again for more cafes in the future.

13. Trustee Comment

Beuthin congratulated Brady on her MLA award and thanked her for sharing her library background story and also thanked Baldwin for her incredible work in the area of finance. In response to several civics class students in attendance she read the library's mission and statement and discussed how the information that they had heard at the meeting reflected a cornerstone of civic engagement.

Odgers echoed Beuthin and noted that TADL is always interested in what teens need and want in their community and library.

Deyo thanked Howard for standing up for Freedom To Read in her piece in the Record Eagle newspaper.

14. Closed Session


A closed session was not needed.

Departmental Reports

for the month of November (December 11, 2025 Board Meeting)

Adult Services

- In November, Melissa put her Outreach hat on and joined Heather Brady for three Book Fair events in the farther out locations in TADL's service area. This was an idea Heather had for helping to engage those communities with TADL and to get books into peoples' hands before the snow falls. We provided books for all ages, TADL swag, and information about the library, plus the opportunity to get a library card. The numbers might look smaller than you'd expect, but every contact was valuable to help these communities know that their library is here for them. At the three fairs (in Long Lake, Williamsburg, and Buckley) we connected with 40 people, mostly families, and we gave out over 100 books, 3 new library cards and renewed 3 others.
- Our programs this month included all of the usual events and partnerships, but we started the month very strong on November 1st with our second Repair Cafe in the morning and a fascinating program with Skegemog Raptor Center about the dangers of hunting with lead bullets for eagles (and humans!) in the afternoon. The Repair Cafe built on the success of the first with almost double the number of people attending and more than double the number of things fixed. By far the biggest need we saw was for fixing lamps. Who knew?? We hope to hold our next Repair Cafe with partners Green Door Folk School in the spring of 2026.

Sight & Sound

November passed like a flash in Sight and Sound! The month started off with the Traverse City Repair Cafe and the Skegemog Raptor Center in the McGuire Room. We partnered with Interlochen Public Radio to present a program on the music of the Theremin, one of the



earliest electronic musical instruments. Patrons were able to experiment with the library's theremin from the Library of Things along with other synthesizers, a local theremin expert performed, and everyone watched the science fiction classic, *The Day the Earth Stood Still*.

Other programs included author events with Chris Hagstrom, a presentation on the history of the Clinch Park Zoo with the Traverse Area Historical Society, and the annual Art of Recovery installation, an art show created by Northern Lakes Community Mental Health Authority.

We have some new arrivals in the Library of Things as well! We have added a Yamaha Portatone keyboard and a Korg microKORG2 synthesizer, along with a Shure SM58 vocal microphone. We also added a second sewing machine due to high demand.

The McGuire Community Room was also used as a voting location for Precinct 7; it is a great honor to be a part of this civic process!

- Repair outdoor bicycle pump



Financial Report Analysis for November 2025

Revenue

As of 11/30, our revenue for Overdue Fines, Sales, and Meeting Room Rentals are all trending well above our YTD budgetary goals. We received \$12,500 in contributions from the TADL Friends of the Library and \$14,700 in donations, most of which (\$12,500) came from four donors. Thank you to our generous donors! Investments gained \$3,814. An invoice has been submitted to Suttons Bay Bingham District Library for Fees/Services, which will bring this line item up to 100%. We are still awaiting payment as of this writing.

Expenditures

Note that percentage of budget completed is 92% as of 11/30/25. Line item details of note are below.

Personnel


Our Goal percentages are different for this category with all payroll related line items (Salaries, FICA, retirement) having goals of 88.5% and all health benefits having goals of 100%. We are meeting these YTD goals well.

Supplies

In both the General Operating Supplies and our Materials line item (Books/Media/etc), we are within our budget goal of 92%. Our Maintenance Supplies line item is above budget for the year. A budget amendment will be needed at year end to account for this.

• Other Services/Charges

With the Member Library payments, Insurance payments, and other once-per-year items that we often pay at the beginning of the year that



usually impacts our adherence to our goal budget percentage each month, we have caught up for the year. This category shows at 81% of budget, with our goal being 92%. With the exception of the items previously mentioned, all line item budgets are within this budgetary goal.

Capital Outlay

No expenditures in this category were made this month.

Meeting Date: December 11, 2025

Library Activity

Lending

Demand for materials continues to increase over last year. Physical Circulation is up 1.2% from last year. E-materials circulations has increased 25.7% from last year.

Visitors – Woodmere, East Bay, and Kingsley Facilities

In November, library visits slowed slightly. The busiest day for October was Tuesday, the 4th, with 1,203 patrons. This was the election day. In November there were 29,618 visitors at East Bay, Kingsley and the Main library. In November 2025, TADL added 228 new patrons district-wide.

Public Computing

The computing services (1,879 uses in November) are about the same as last year (1,857) and lower than last month (2,388).

Additions to the Collection

In November 2025, 2,499 items were added to the district. November ends the purchasing time in order to have all orders final for the end of year budget amendment.

Behavior Issues

There were 8 incidents resulting in 1 suspension in October. This includes 1 incident at Kingsley and 1 incident at Fife Lake. The 1 suspension was a result of intoxication.

Community Help During the Holidays

This year TADL launched a new website: <u>tadl.org/saves</u>. This website explains the many ways that using your library card can help people save money this holiday season and year-round. Additionally, we

have dropped off over 1,500 pounds of food to Father Fred so far during our food drive. Thank you to our generous patron who are helping those in need!


Governor's first literacy conference scheduled for December 13, 2025.



Executive Summary

To guide this effort, the Traverse Area District Library (hereafter, TADL) Board selected Midwest Collaborative for Library Services (MCLS) to facilitate a strategic planning process to help visualize future library services guided by the aspirations and needs of the community. Based on the work of The Harwood Institute for Public Innovation, community members were asked, "What kind of community do you want?" and "How can the library help?"

Based on a community survey, sector interviews, and focus group input, the Strategic Planning Committee distilled the information into four strategic service priorities for the period of 2026-2028. The priorities are:



<u>Lead with Intention and Joy</u> Embracing public trust and supporting an informed and engaged community.



Optimize Physical Spaces
Developing and adapting our service spaces to best meet the needs of our community.



Inspiring life-long literacy by championing curiosity and access to knowledge.



Cultivate Connections

Sparking community engagement and connections.

It also ensures more buy-in from stakeholders and guidance when everyone involved knows what, when and who will be initiating potential projects.

TADL will review this document each year to incorporate the ever-changing opportunities for library, and the needs and interests of the community.

Measurement Plan

TADL will collect and monitor data at regular intervals to gauge how the plans goals are progressing. This monitoring will provide the library with the information needed to continually refine and enhance activities that reflect the changing needs and interests of the community.

Each strategy in the plan includes an intention, with both qualitative and quantitative data. Qualitative data will come from surveys and provide information on outcomes, or about how people feel about an activity. Quantitative data will be collected from the library's integrated library system or manual tallies.

Appendix A - Additional Information

Communications Plan

- The Strategic Plan will be made available on the library's website (tadl.org/strategic-plan).
- A social media marketing piece will be created and shared on Facebook and Instagram.
- A print marketing piece which states the values, vision, mission, and key priorities will be distributed at the library and other locations.
- An announcement about the new strategic plan will be made in the library's newsletter.

Financial Resources and Sustainability

- Our Operating Fund Budget will be based on available sources of public funding and will not exceed the assessed value growth quotient for the budget year.
- State and Federal grants and grants from other institutions may supplement the budget.
- Collaboration with other groups in providing programs and services will enable cost-sharing.

Professional Development Plan

- The Library Director and Human Resources Manager will meet quarterly to assess staff training and discern areas of need.
- All staff will be encouraged to attend pertinent training, webinars, and conferences each year, and to take advantage of learning opportunities.

Collaboration

- We have memberships in the Michigan Library Association, Midwest Collaborative for Library Services (MCLS), and Traverse Connect (formerly the Chamber of Commerce).

- We collaborate with all the local municipalities within our service area, which include: Grand Traverse County, City of Traverse City, East Bay Charter Township, Village of Kingsley, Village of Fife Lake, Interlochen, and Peninsula Township.
- Some of our key community partners include NorthEd, TCAPS, Born to Read, Traverse Area Community Media, and many others. We continue to grow our community partnerships.



Appendix B – Process Overview/Timeline

Winter, 2024/2025 - TADL Board approved selection of MCLS for this project.

Spring, 2025 – A 17-person Strategic Planning Committee was assembled, which included representatives from the Library Board and the TADL leadership team.

July, 2025 – Kickoff Meeting & Interview Planning

The Strategic Planning Committee brainstormed a list of community leaders to interview to encompass eight key sectors of the community for a wide range of views and input.



4) It's planning time again! We're starting out on another three-year strategic plan, and input opportunities are coming up - reserve a Community Conversation spot or watch for our online survey (coming soon).

August, 2025 – MCLS conducted five Community Conversations Sessions took place at Woodmere, East Bay, and Kingsley. The sessions were widely advertised and open to anyone. Between these two efforts, 61 community leaders and members engaged with the process.

Community leader interviews and Community Conversation input was used to create the Community Engagement Report, including a "Community Narrative" to summarize the public knowledge gathered.

September, 2025 - MCLS and TADL created a public community survey that was offered through the TADL library website (and on paper) at all three TADL branch locations. There were 471 responses to the survey, and MCLS created a Survey Report of the anonymous data.





Appendix B, continued

September 18, 2025 – Study Session with TADL's full board (at Peninsula Community Library). Board members received an overview of the community engagement process and were asked to respond to the Community Engagement Report findings from their perspective.

September 19, 2025 – Staff member focus group session, offered to all staff members who were not already serving on the Strategic Planning Committee. Seventeen staff members opted in to receive an overview of the community engagement process and were asked to respond to the Community Engagement Report findings from their perspective.

October 15, 2025 – The full Strategic Planning Committee attended a Planning Retreat at the Woodmere library. They participated in a SOAR analysis of the library, identifying strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results. The strengths became the basis for the library's core values; the aspirations became the basis of the plan's vision statement; and opportunities resulted in the identification of key service priorities.

October 22, 2025 – The MCLS consultant facilitated a retreat with an Operational Committee made up of many of the library's management staff. Work included a tactical plan to address the four key focus areas that were identified at the 10/15/2025 Strategic Planning Retreat.

Teams considered the following questions for each focus area: "How will the patron benefit?"; "How will the community benefit?"; "What activities might occur?" "What will success look like?"; "What organizational issues will need to be addressed, including facilities, technology, policies, staffing, etc.?" This work created the basis for the development of goals, objectives, and activities that make up this final strategic plan.

November, 2025 – MCLS returned a final draft of this strategic plan. Library staff continued to refine goals, objectives, and activities. Library managers created an initial implementation plan that addressed potential activities and assigned a target date for startup and/or completion, and which department(s) or people would be assigned responsibility. Assignments and work related to each new initiative will reveal a plan that is flexible and evolving, in order to adapt to changes that may be needed along the way. A measurement plan was created to track the progress of the goals identified in the Strategic Plan.



Appendix C - Survey Comments

Survey comments are included on the following pages.





Completed by 471 people, not every person chose to answer every question that was presented to them.

Open-answer questions are unedited to maintain authenticity of the comments. In some cases (where noted), they remain unedited but are loosely grouped to help the reader see patterns.

Q1: Do you or anyone in your household have a TADL library card?

97.45% of those who took the survey either had a Traverse Area District Library card or someone in their household had a TADL card.

Q2: If the answer is no what is preventing you from getting a card?

The top choice for what is preventing (12) respondents from getting a library card is a tie between "preferred to buy their books and materials" and simply not making it a priority (which was not a choice offered, but three people listed that in the Other responses as follows):

- Even though I grew up in TC and had card for the Sixth Street library, I haven't gotten one since I moved back! I need to!
- I'm new to the area, travel often, still work part time and just haven't made it a priority to get to the library
- I'm thinking about getting a card, just haven't done so yet

Two respondents each noted they were not interested in what the library had to offer and that they use the space or attend events, but don't need a card to do that. One respondent each noted they were too busy, that the location was unknown or not convenient, and that they don't live in Traverse City.

Q3: What city/twp/village do you live in?

Range of answers in northwest Michigan provided.

Q4: What is your age? (Asked in an effort to make sure we reach all demographic groups)

Those aged 65-74 accounted for almost a third (29.19%) of respondents to this question. Almost even were 35-44 years at 16.97% and 75+ years at 16.74% of respondents. Less than 1% of respondents were under 18, but it is noteworthy that there were respondents from every age category.

Q5: How often do you visit the library?

Survey respondents are mostly library users, with the highest number (39.05%) visiting the library 4+ times per month, 30% visiting 1-3 times a month, and the amounts of answers



going in order down the scale. Four respondents have never visited the library. While it would be helpful to hear from non-users, this is typical as most people who will know about and take the time to respond to a library survey are those who already have some interest in the library and its services.

Q6: How do you use library services? (Choose all that apply.)

Note that people could – and did – choose more than one answer (all that applied for them.) Answers in order of popularity:

- Borrowing physical items at 86.82%
- Attending programs and events
- Borrowing digital items
- Receiving help from library staff.



81.37% of respondents used the Main Library most often.



Of the smaller locations, Kingsley was chosen as a primary location most often, then East Bay. Next was online service with 3.07%. There were single-digit numbers of respondents from each of the member libraries as well. No one selected the Mobile Library as their most used location.

Q8: Considering the location you visit most, are the facilities welcoming, accessible, and well-maintained?

Overall, most respondents answered "Yes, very" regarding the physical buildings and grounds being welcoming, accessible, and well-maintained for the location they visited most. Only three individuals (all regarding Main Library) answered "Not really", and no one said "No" for any location. As a whole, the community seems very pleased with the physical library spaces.

Comments about the Main Library:

- Well used and looking like it. Kept neat an tidy but wearing down and dated. Also, larger and increasing homeless presence last 5 years.
- Too many vagrant-type people around ... it is not safe in that area anymore
- Homeless people can be a problem. People talking loudly is also an issue.
- I stopped visiting the library when it became a hangout for people without housing. I'm sympathetic to that population but I saw behaviors that made visitation uncomfortable. I was told by management that all were welcome. My thought was that evidently not me.
- Building exterior & grounds need better maintenance grounds behind building are in poor condition
- some areas have smells; there is moisture/mold/mildew scent along the west wall facing the lake toward the north end of the building. why weren't things like furniture updated vs paying for a not-needed bathroom remodel?
- Snow removal in parking lot & on curb cuts/sidewalk
- The atrium counter is messy and the paneling is flaking off. The ceiling has evidence of water damage in places.
- The new restrooms are pretty but not really any better than before excepting the push button entry/exit.. the floor looks dirty, the toilet paper dispensers are too low and that's not an ADA issue and do not cut the roll properly and it's still hard to turn around in the regular stalls, eliminating just one would have allowed the others to be just enough bigger so people didn't use the handicapped stall sometimes making the handicapper wait and the foaming soap is good the soap dispensers however are terrible; there is no designated nursing area for new moms either; people still smoke in their cars making the surrounding air hard to breathe; thanks for the water bottle dispensers; need to knock off some of the noise of poeple on their phones and having zooms or tutoring or whatever in the reading



areas, they forget where they are and talk as if they are outside, on a playground; seaasonal decorations have been very nice, especially this summer; thanks for melcal; what happened to the Reference books, some of them I use all the time are not there and I can't find them anywhere; not enough parking; the clock tower time is off--different time each side; genre the fiction collection and cut the trees in the back they are blocking that beautiful view I paid for

- Carpeting and furniture seems worn and dated. It is nice to have the variety of social spaces to choose from like couches, chairs, and tables.
- Signage in entry lobby needs beefing up. Eliminate the charging stations--limited use.
- The de facto homeless shelter nature of the library makes it less welcoming and accessible than it would otherwise be
- The parking area has a lot of blind spots and can be difficult to navigate safely with small children in tow.
- The parking lot makes me a little nervous...So many cars coming and going...
- Generally good, but have noticed a rougher crown lately and I would like to recommend
 that enforcement start to enforce loitering on all the grounds if these individuals will not be
 making positive use of our tax payer dollars by means of learning and giving back to this
 community in a positive way.
- Parking is terrible
- Homeless population in nearby areas can make visiting uncomfortable
- If possible, some updates to things would be nice, but that's more appearance-wise. I think the library does everything they can to be accessible to everyone and they do all they can to keep the grounds and building maintained.
- Parking can be a problem
- Security concerns inside the library and surrounding property
- Ice/water in the winter is bit worrisome. Great bathrooms. Comfortable light and seating.
- Always clean and neat inside the library ad outside. Thank you for the nice, clean bathrooms and water bottle refilling station.
- I love this library and appreciate the services and accommodations provided! From WiFi to meeting spaces to the book reservation system, this library system is top notch
- Snow/slush is often an issue in winter.
- Like seeing the protesters out in front
- Absolutely love the gardens out back!
- Love the flowers outside. The sunny environment upstairs (especially in winter)
- The little free library needs paint.
- Parking sometimes is an issue especially if an event is going on.
- The main library is clean, well kept. The children's section is well-organized, engaging, and welcoming.
- Beautiful building and seems well maintained. Lots of quiet places to sit and read in comfortable chairs.

TRAVERSE AREA DISTRICT

- It's the most beautiful library around!
- very friendly, helpful staff
- The parking lot is often full in the summer and during popular events. I don't know if it's possible to expand the parking lot, but it's something that should have some thought into. If impossible, maybe a paved walkway or some sort of trail from Hull park? People may park there but have to cross the railroad tracks to get to the Library
- Easier access from north side to children's garden.
- Parking can be "tight" occasionally
- Sometimes I avoid areas where (apparently) unhoused people are resting (due to my own nervousness about their behavior, or smells), but I'm glad that they have a safe place to be in our library.
- Occasionally the parking lot has nearly been full, but I've always gotten a spot.
- They have LIBRARIANS there!
- I wish there were a way to access the children's garden from the back of inside the building. When visiting the library with little children, that extra walk all the way around the building to get to the garden is often too much for them. The pathways on the sides of the building are also not very welcoming.
- Love the welcoming feeling I get when entering the library!
- It's like a second home
- More parking. Access with Woodmare; traffic congestion, dangers of making a left.
- I think some people might comment negatively on the presence of unhoused people in the library but I am proud of our library for allowing a safe warm (or cold depending on the season) place for all people to exist.
- The environment is fantastic. Safe, clean, a quiet respite that allows the joy of stories.
- I love the train area with the flowers and walking story. It's beautiful

outside on nice days but then you have toddlers running into the parking lot. Hard to hold onto two toddlers when it's just an open grassy field. At least inside the doors close.

After sing and stomp they invite us over to the library for snacks and crafts but that library sure does fill up fast. I'd love to let my girls play but there's too many people and not enough space or toys. East Bay needs a larger building. I get the historical significance of the building, wasn't it the original one? But it's time to embrace the future!

- It's accessible, the parking lot is small. They make use of the clerk for sing and stomp but both buildings are getting to small for the amount of people they serve. Sing and stomp has maxed out the clerks office space, parking is difficult. And afterward they welcome everyone to the library for crafts and snacks but we all don't fit especially with all the kids running around. East Bay Branch needs more space! Q9: Thoughts on programming and events at location you visit most

Overall, 78.80% thought the library location they visited the most served the needs of its local community "Very well" through community services and programming, with about 21% answering "Somewhat" or "Neutral." One single person thought their most-visited location rated "Not that well," and no one answered "Not at all" for any location.

The following are the breakdowns of answers to this question about services and programming by specific location:

11.57% of respondents answered that they would like to see another branch or additional outreach services added in the community. About half of respondents were unsure.

Q11: Best ways for the library to communicate with you about resources and programs?

This question asked for "all that apply", so respondents could choose multiple answers.

Monthly eNewsletter emails was the top choice for how respondents felt the library should communicate with them about resources and programs with 80.64% selecting that. Just over half (54.66%) selected the Library website and just under half (48.53%) selected Inlibrary advertising such as posters and flyers. Next were Social media and Community calendars.

All suggested communication methods were chosen by 49 or more people. Just one person indicated that none of these communication methods would work for them, and that individual did not offer a better method.

Suggestions typed in were (unedited):

- Notices shared by partner agencies/groups.
- via neighborhood associations?
- The Ticker (2)
- For social media, specifically Facebook. For community calendars, specifically, the Ticker. For local newspapers, specifically Northern Express.

Well over half of participants in the survey were already aware of ALL the listed services.

The three services with the highest awareness were Audio books, Loan of videos and music, and eBooks. 81.13% knew about the Library of Things.

When asked for suggestions for additional services to be offered by the library, respondents shared the following:

• Cardio drumming class - It is a great class & offered at EB library, but only once a month. Maybe offer it here? (Note: Main Library)



- Please add cardio drumming to Woodmere Branch. I got to East Bay. Matt does such a great job! I love it!
- It would be great to have a cafe inside, or a food truck with coffee and snacks in the parking lot! I would make more use of the library at times of the day when I need a break or a snack.
- Coffee shop

- MakerSpace to use a Glowforge or have someone help me use a Cricut die cut machine

About one-half of respondents designated Quiet reading/study areas to be of High importance. About one-third of respondents designated Large group meeting rooms to be of High importance. Next for High importance was Small group meeting space with just under one-fourth choosing that.

Makerspace was chosen by 50.42% for Low importance though about one-third listed that as Medium and 15.32% listed that as High for importance. More library outreach was chosen by 35.00% as being of Low importance.

Q14 What area of needs or wants in your community might the Library help address with resources, services, or programs? Please choose all that apply and provide specific details in the space provided.

Answered: 362 Skipped: 109

The top choice, with 63.81%, for what respondents are looking for at the library is Hobbies such as gardening, baking, cooking, bike repair, sewing, etc. Next is Author talks with 54.97% choosing that. This is followed by Social/gathering opportunities with 52.49%.

There were many other things that respondents are interested in as well.

When asked other ideas or to provide specific details about topics of interest, respondents shared the following:

- Technology class for VERY beginners real basics about how to use phone and computers.
 An individual one-on-one session for tech help in addition to the Tues. AM tech help I need lots of help and don't want to tie up the 2nd floor staff on Tuesday AM for a long time.
 Speakers on topics about wellness/nutrition. Last summer (224 I think) Peninsula Library had speakers from U of M hospital about skin cancer, cardiology, etc. and the were great programs, so programs similar to that would be wonderful.
- Regular/drop in sessions for help with iPhones, tablets/iPads, laptops. Financial monthly 30 minute talk about various aspects like insurance, filing for SS, budgets, etc.



- Library should not compete with entertainment venues, but could address technical needs, such as access to health/social service/technology resources
- I would like classes on using computers editing videos, making posters, excel, etc.
- board games
- Hosting an evening Toastmasters club would benefit the community--most clubs need a free or nearly free space. Before we moved to TC, we were active in the Dallas Genealogical Society, and thus spent a lot of time at the downtown library. That library ended up embracing a part of homelessness services; an minimally used book resale shop was repurposed as a place to get unsheltered people connected to social services. As long as people behaved, they could spend the day (in air conditioning). It is worth noting that some of the upper floors were pretty lightly used and this didn't create much of a problem.
- None of the listed issues affect me directly, but I am aware that there are serious community issues that are currently having an impact on the library (e.g., unhoused people, mental health issues of some community members). Some of these probably need to be addressed early before they become (more) problematic.
- I would like to emphasize keeping the library a neutral welcoming place where all are welcome respecting each other and pouring into the community that will help future generations. Some topics may be too complex to tackle without more resources (time, expertise, and money) As for skills training and career support, there are several government programs that already exist doing this work connect people with those resources no need to recreate something that already exists. Smae with environmental issues, many organizations already doing this connect people to those programs/groups.... Several of these topics could be referred to existing programming in the area.
- No need to recreate existing services please partner with those already doing things on this list. Michigan works for job search, SBDC for business support, MiSTEM for STEM education, Great Start Collaborative for parenting and early childhood programs, NorthEd/Michigan Works Adult Ed program for skills training, financial literacy, and digital literacy, etc

- We love sing and stomp with Mr. Matt! We love how friendly everyone is and how the library is trying to be where people are and what people need.
- The East Bay Branch staff is amazing. They learn your name and get to know you. It feels
 very community driven and not just check in and check out. Mr. Matt is amazing at sing and
 stomp. All the kids love him. I've made friends at these events and my kids are engaged. We
 love it.
- As a Traverse Area Historical Society member, I really appreciate the partnership with have with TADL and our ability to hold programming in the McGuire Room.



- I was very surprised to learn that the library lent out a metal detector. I was recently looking for travel material & the attendant went above & beyond to help me find additional material. The option for curbside pick up is the most valuable to me, since I'm disabled.
- Love that you have puzzles to borrow. Also I sometimes stop & work on a puzzle if I have time between appts.
- I DM (dungeon master) as part of a library program, and this single event constitutes a large part of my social life.
- I love digital and audio books for traveling.
- LGBTQIA+ information has saved lives.
- The library has brought endless joy to my partner and I. We go near weekly to check out books, CDs, comics, movies and shows. When we finish a book we swap them with each other, discussing our thoughts on the narrative and exchanging our perspectives. We check out CDs and listen to them on long drives. Often we pick a movie or two at random and have a movie night. Even though we are both grown, we often walk the 'story walk'. We read the new story on display while checking in on the fish in the pond and the bees on the flowers. I can't imagine a life without the library as it enriches our lives beyond belief.
- My family and I always feel safe, welcomed, and connected when we're in the library, which

- We recently formed a writing group and the library has been able to host our meetings, allowing us to stay engaged with each other and workshop writing in a free, private, reservable space.

heart. Amy's ability to juggle so many responsibilities but still can take the time to welcome everyone . Brian and Erin do the same.

- I have never felt quite at home here, there was a time where I could find quiet areas to work. The library has become more than just a place for studious or readers, it is now a home for many who do not have a home of their own. I would say, there needs to be a balance between these to two groups, to make it comfortable for everyone, including staff. I no longer think of the library as somewhere that I will be undisturbed for hours, a cafe has more security than that, which is where I now go to study or work on my computer. Everyone deserves to be at the library, but the library can only do so much and the ouness falls upon the local government of Traverse City to support unhoused and mentally ill individuals.

- Ms. Beth she's always been an amazing librarian- she's had a role in making reading/libary exciting for my son & we enjoy seeing her when we stop in!
- Oh, so many! Most recently the Big Kid storytime at the Kingsley Library has bee a valuable resource for out family. They enjoy getting to do engaging activities in the garden with Ms.
 Beth, neat stories, and dance and do crafts with friends of similar age (6 year old and 9 year old)

- A place to go when life is too much and just take time to read or look at the lake and find center again
- Everybody is so helpful there I always feel welcome when I come to the library. It is a wonderful place to be
- Help finding book for book reports. The summer reading program and all the fun activities
- I assist people with their income tax returns, and have used the library as a central meeting place, especially when the tax season is complete.
- I work for a nonprofit and we often use the library to print out materials, hang flyers of community-based events that we are hosting and borrowing items such as the projector screens from the library of things.

I would pick them up after work on Tues, we would go do our club thing and get more books and go for tacos, only for two years...they still talk about it at age 12 and both are insatiable readers! Also, the one still here in TC has taken advantage of the musical instruments, checking out a ukulele, banjo, and most recently the electric guitar and mastered them all via YouTube!
- Reference librarians are great! Many times they have helped me find a book at another library in Michigan. Children's librians equally good at recommending books for pre-school children.
- I arrange to meet so many people "by the puzzles, overlooking the lake" and I love to see them look at Boardman Lake with awe. Thank you for making space for our inhoused neighbors.
- I've never had a negative experience. Our family moved to TC in 1980 due to a job transfer. One of the first things I did was register our family at the Library.
- We don't have internet access at home at the moment, so my teenager is doing his homework at the library.
- I moved here one year ago and the library has been crucial to helping me and my toddler integrate into the community. The story times at the Woodmere branch are wonderful!!!
- I was born in 1969 in Traverse City and grew up here. My library was the Sixth Street building. In the basement of that building in the early 1980s was a personal computer that you could use by reserving it by the hour. Using that computer was my first experience with that form of technology that would go on to become the major event of my life. I didn't know at the time, but those experiences really shaped me in ways that I am still unpacking.
- I rely a lot on the internet-library loans and the ability to pick up books at the main library.
- Recently I wanted to read a German novel, which is only available in German. The library organizes a copy from UoM.
- TADL has some very Outstanding people on staff. I've always felt welcome and relaxed in the various libraries I've visited.
- I'm in my 70's. My dad was using the Flint Public Library when my brothers & I were very young (pre-teen). We were each seated in a booth with headphones, a record player and access to hundreds of records.... While our Dad studied in the Reference Area... learning about these New automated transmissions in cars. Back 1960...
- After my mother died I found respite in reading charming cottage mysteries because they were unlikely to feed into my grief. That's when I discovered the electronic lists on my account page and the hold option. You guys got me through that first year.
- I've been going to the main library since before I could talk, I remember what a godsend this place was when my father was job hunting, me and my sister would wait in the computer queue so we could play games next to him. we would spend hours here a day reading, playing, and having fun. I'm glad I can visit this place and be reminded of what was and what can be.



- The library is one of our favorite places, personally. It has also provided space for our Bis and Littles from Big Brothers Big Sisters to meet, receive tutoring, and enjoy time with each other. I appreciated so much the lunches that were provided over the summer and made sure each of my families that could benefit knew this. Thank you for all you do.
- When we first moved here (July 2020) we visited the East Bay library to sign-up for library cards. I had my young children in the car, and a librarian came out to greet us (in a social distance responsible way) and had brought with her at-home craft kits for my children. It was such a thoughtful touch that it made me tear up. Libraries really add color to our lives.
- We moved here from an area that had a robust library system, and we were able to access two major metropolitan area libraries as well. We've been delighted with the services provided by TADL, and while we sometimes wish that the selection of newer books was better, the children's STEAM programming, library of things, and 3D printing services are all top notch!

- When I moved here two years ago, I didn't know anybody. I brought my kids to the story time at the library and everyone there was just so kind and welcoming. Now the library is one of the places we feel most comfortable in traverse city. The kids programming is great and the amount and variety of books in the kids room is awesome. I also love the ability to use Melcat to get books that our own library system doesn't have.
- Everytime I see a child running toward the Children's area it makes me smile. Seeing that
 level of excitement and enthusiasm for being at the library is a wonderful part of the
 foundation upon which they are building their life. Getting a text that my MelCat request is
 in is also fun:)
- The library has been a primary source (in part through MeL), along with the internet, in my self-care/treatment of my complex-PTSD over the past several years. I've also learned about various somatic practices for other physical issues, listened to songs on CDs for musical inspiration, and brushed up on languages by watching foreign language films on DVDs.
- I am ever grateful for access to books that I wish to read. So far the Michigan library system has not failed to find even my most obscure requests!
- I love the inter-library loan program. We have a great collection but if there is a less popular book I want to borrow I love having access to that too. I use this feature often!
- One of your staff members helped me borrow a book from an out of town library through the State system. I appreciated the help obtaining a copy because it allowed me to read the only book I had not read by this author. Staff was very helpful and kind.
- during covid we loved that you kept us in books
- The positive impact is how much money you save me every month. Thank you
- My husband is an independent chef and has benefited greatly from your vast collection of cookbooks! Being able to borrow those as well as fiction for fun reading has saved us so much money vs. buying books, and we also like the sustainability aspect.
- I work at the Woodmere location. I've learned so much from the material I work with, of course, but also the people I interact with. I see things from different perspectives and think of things that never crossed my mind before. It's an enriching and meaningful experience for me.
- This is probably a bit of a strange thing but it's by far the most memorable time I've had at any library. There was a time when I was in college and I was studying for most of an afternoon at the main library, on the second floor at the tables by the windows that look out over Boardman Lake. I was prepping for a test for an underwater archaeology class I was taking and by some wild coincidence an actual underwater archaeologist was doing research on some local shipwreck history in the library that day. We sat across from each other for a good twenty minutes absorbed in our work before realizing we were researching the same subject, and then we had a little chat in which he gave me some wonderful advice. I think my favorite part of the library is the sense of community it creates and the connections it provides, even just by simply being a shared space.

- A library employee helped us as we began searching for information regarding our 1905 house history.
- All the supervisory visits I do for childhood family services are a huge positive in our foster children's lives. If a parent is not well-versed in How, library can provide resources, the staff are always cheerful and helpful.
